It's a pleasure to give a volunteer view of Faith's office staff and their contribution to the church as a whole. I am always impressed by the fact that this is not "just a job" to them. Yes, they are responsible for the "business" aspect of keeping things running smoothly at Faith, but it is also a ministry unto itself. Each day is different in the church office and the office volunteers can witness how there is no "routine." For example, a funeral service will take priority and need "extra hands on deck" to keep that and other tasks going. Also, consider hospital emergencies or members who need a sympathetic ear. Each staff

member is always sympathetic, respectful and helpful to anyone needing help.

Becky Miller put it well, being unaware until she started volunteering in the church office "how much walk-in traffic there is. Every time I'm here people walk in to ask for help. And that's just when I'm here, so I know it's a lot more. Staff interact with them every day."

I've been volunteering in the office for 25 years and consider it a joy to be of some help to these dedicated and appreciative staff members. They are each

a hardworking and efficient part of Faith's ministry to the members and community.






